OUR SCHOOL BUILDING

A Proud Past and an Exciting Future!

Dunclug Primary School is situated on the north side of Ballymena within easy reach of the many growing residential developments and the surrounding rural areas of the borough. The school shares a superbly facilitated site with Dunclug Nursery School and Dunclug College. We are fortunate to have extensive grounds with separate playgrounds allocated to different age groups, fruit and vegetable gardens and large grass areas with hedgerows and trees.

The school was opened in 1971 and was named after the townland of Dunclug, meaning 'fortified hill.' The name symbolises the school as a focal point in the community on the north side of Ballymena. Dunclug Primary School is a controlled, co-educational, all-inclusive primary school. We welcome children from all religious and ethnic backgrounds and social classes. Children with a disability or specific learning difficulty are also most welcome.

Facilities include several learning support rooms, a well-stocked library, ICT stations, several resource areas, an assembly hall and a separate dining room with meals prepared on site. All classrooms are well equipped and have interactive white boards alongside computers, laptops and iPads with safe and supervised internet access.

Outside, a superb outdoor play facility promotes this crucial aspect of the curriculum and is in daily use by a variety of classes. We also have a large playing field, an attractive quiet play area with seating and several raised beds for classes to grow their own vegetables. Resources are constantly improved and extended through the support of a very active parent and teachers association.

Our Vision

To provide a caring, safe and stimulating environment where pupils are nurtured and challenged to fulfil their potential and grow to be happy, confident and responsible young people.

Board of Governors

The school's Board of Governors bring a wealth of enthusiasm and commitment to ensuring Dunclug Primary is an effective school, meeting the needs of the children and the community it serves. They make decisions in areas such as curriculum content, finance, community links, pastoral care, child protection and promoting good behaviour. The governors work closely with the Principal and staff to ensure all children fulfil their potential in all areas of the curriculum.

Staff

Our classes benefit, not only from their own dedicated teachers and team of classroom assistants, but also from the contribution of a wide range of auxiliary and ancillary staff permanently employed on site. In addition, learning support staff, music tutors, sports coaches and many others visit the school every week, providing a valuable network of support for our staff and pupils.

CURRICULUM

Dunclug Primary School is committed to delivering the Northern Ireland Primary Curriculum. The school embraces innovation, while retaining traditional best practice.

3 Stages of the Primary Curriculum

Foundation Stage: P1 & P2 Key Stage One: P3 & P4 Key Stage Two: P5, 6 & 7

The curriculum for the three stages is set out in six Areas of Learning. These include:

Our dedicated teachers use a wide range of teaching strategies and resources, depending on the needs of the children and the subject being covered. Activities are carefully matched to pupils' individual needs and abilities to ensure effective learning.



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ASSESSMENT

Pupil progress is monitored closely daily and pupils are formally assessed in literacy and numeracy in September and May each year. This progress is discussed with parents through parental consultation and end of year reports sent home in June.

How will I know how my child is doing?

Parent-Teacher consultations are held twice a year in October and February. An appointment with your child's class teacher can be arranged, should you wish to speak about your child's progress.

An open day takes place in December.

A comprehensive annual written report is issued in June.

A summative Record of Achievement is issued in Primary 7 celebrating a child's achievements, both academic and non-academic, while at Dunclug Primary School.



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HOMEWORK

At Dunclug Primary School we believe that homework can play an important part in reinforcing the learning which has taken place in the classroom. Homework is often further practice of work already learnt in school and may include reading, spellings, number facts and written activities. Homework should be an enjoyable experience and last between 15 and 45 minutes depending on the age of the child.

- Parents can help their child by:
- Setting a regular time for homework.
- Ensuring there is a suitable surface to work on, away from distractions
- Showing an interest in homework, signing it each night and informing the teacher if their child is having difficulty.

TRANSFER PROCEDURE

The school ensures all children are well prepared for admission to secondary level education. The majority of pupils transfer to Dunclug College, Ballymena Academy or Cambridge House.



RE, MUSIC AND U.I.C.T

Religious Education

We offer a programme of Religious Education throughout the school. Religious Education is provided within class and also at our weekly assemblies where we have visits from local ministers.

Pupils may be withdrawn from RE teaching, if desired, following a written request and consultation with the principal.



Music

Music plays an important part in the life of our school. Music is taught throughout the school and pupils develop their basic skills in recorder playing from Primary 4 onwards. Pupils have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument from Primary 4. Experienced tutors from the Education Authority offer lessons for Strings, Woodwind and Brass instruments.

Children have the opportunity to develop their music skills by joining our very successful school choir. Pupils perform at school events, Radio Cracker, local nursing home visits and cross-community concerts with local schools.



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U.I.C.T.

Using Information Communication Technology (U.I.C.T.) plays a significant role in the curriculum at Dunclug Primary School, enhancing learning and teaching in all classrooms.

All pupils have access to a wide range of U.I.C.T. resources. All classrooms are well equipped and have interactive white boards alongside computers, laptops and iPads with safe and supervised internet access.

At Dunclug Primary School we understand the responsibility to educate our pupils in E-Safety issues. We aim to teach our pupils appropriate behaviours and critical thinking that will enable them to remain safe and responsible when using the internet, both in and beyond our classrooms.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Each year we offer a range of extra-curricular activities. Some of these are run by outside providers and others are run by our dedicated teaching staff. Examples of some of these include:

At Dunclug Primary School, we recognise that not all pupils progress or develop at similar rates and where children are experiencing difficulties, extra support and assistance is provided by our learning support team so that these children too can reach their full potential.

Our learning support team, coordinated by a full time designated learning support coordinator, work in partnership with children, parents and relevant outside agencies to ensure equality of access to all.

When necessary, individual education plans are agreed upon which target specific areas in the child's development. The child's progress towards meeting these targets is carefully monitored and their progression supported by all involved in the child's development.

Pastoral care

At Dunclug Primary School we are committed to providing each pupil with the best opportunities to develop academically, emotionally, physically and socially. We strive to provide the best for every pupil.

Safeguarding and Child Protection

At Dunclug Primary School we have a responsibility for the care, welfare, safety and therefore the learning environment of all our pupils and staff. One way in which we seek to protect our pupils is by helping them to learn about the risks of possible abuse, helping them to recognise unwelcome behaviour in others and acquire the confidence and skills they need to keep themselves safe.

The arrangements for Safeguarding and Child Protection are set out in the school's Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy which is given to all new parents and updates are regularly provided. Copies are also available on our website: www.dunclugps.com

The purpose of the school's procedures on Child Protection is to protect our pupils by ensuring that everyone who works at our school - teachers, non-teaching staff and adult volunteers - has clear guidance on the action which is required where abuse of a child is suspected. All staff receive child protection training each year and visitors report in and out wearing visible passes. All of our learning community are involved in our policy development and all parents are regularly given information relating to safeguarding and child protection.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR POLICY

We have a system of positive rewards and encouragement for desirable behaviour and a system of sanctions for unacceptable behaviour. Parental support is essential to maintain high standards of behaviour. We expect parents to give our Positive Behaviour Policy their full support.

The purpose of our school's positive behaviour is to:

- Encourage and praise good behaviour;
- Prevent and discourage inappropriate behaviour;
- Deal with inappropriate behaviour in a fair and consistent manner;
- Develop behavioural skills in the pupils that will benefit both them and the community in which they live and learn creating a calm, learning culture
- Have effective whole school anti-bullying procedures.

Bullying is a highly distressing and damaging form of abuse and is not tolerated in school. Staff are vigilant at all times to the possibility of bullying occurring and will take immediate steps to stop it happening, to protect and reassure the victim.

GENERAL INFORMATION

SCHOOL HOURS

The playground is supervised from 8.45am and classes commence at 9am.

After a short settling in period P1 children finish at 2pm along with P2 and P3.

P4–P7 children finish at 3pm.

Morning Break (all pupils): 10.30–10.45am

Lunch Break P1–P1: 12.20–1pm

SCHOOL MEALS

These are cooked on site in line with nutritional guidelines. Menus are provided in advance and meals are served in our school dining centre. Application forms for free school meals are available from our school secretary.

BREAKFAST CLUB

Our free breakfast club, funded by St Vincent De Paul, has proven very popular and runs every day from 8.30am.

ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS AND INDUCTION OF NEW PUPILS

Dunclug Primary School adheres to a fully inclusive admissions policy. We welcome applications from all families. Parents considering sending their children to the school may contact the Principal if they wish to arrange an appointment to visit. The school also holds an open afternoon at the beginning of December.

Children who are admitted to Dunclug Primary School embark on a programme of induction commencing in June. To begin to establish an effective home/school partnership, Primary One children and their parents attend an Induction Afternoon prior to school commencing to meet the teacher and receive information. Primary One teachers also meet the children in their Pre-School settings in June. A Parent Information Event is held in September and Parent Consultations in October and February.

At the beginning of September pupils come to school for a shorter period. After this initial settling in time children stay in school until lunchtime. From the third week in September, the school day for P1 ends at 2pm.
